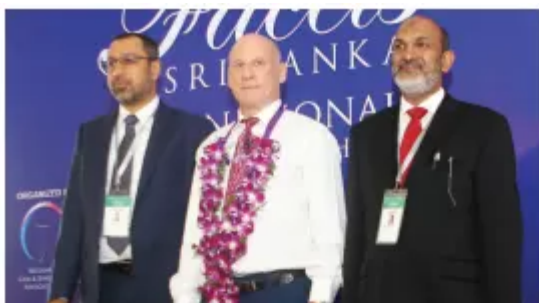


FACETS SRI LANKA 2019 GEM & JEWELLERY EXHIBITION
