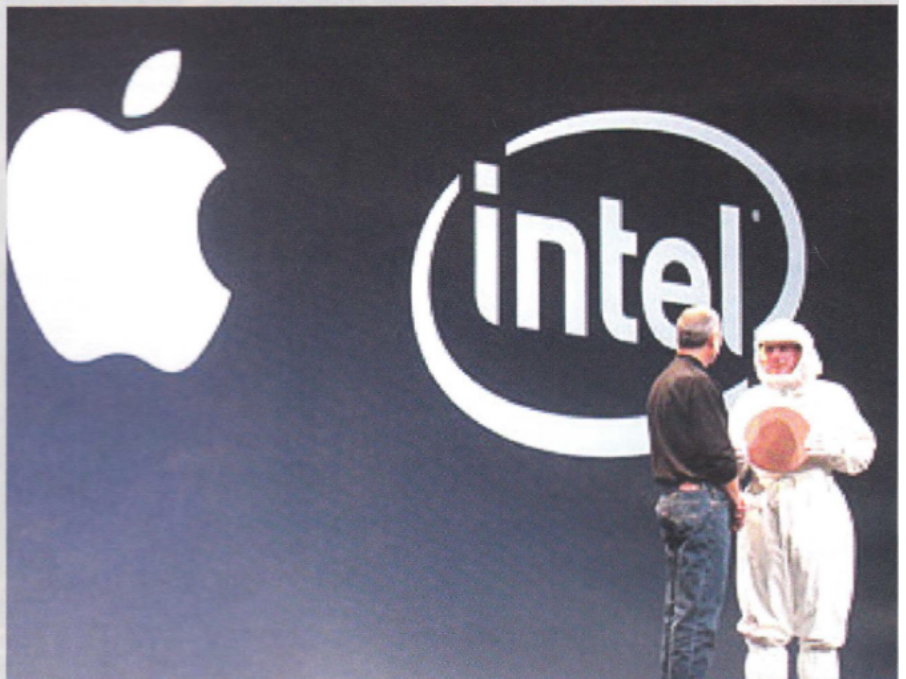

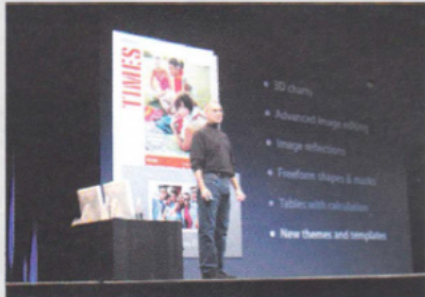

Intel CEO Paul Otellini reports that Intel is ready with the Intel Duo Core chip for the new Mac computers.



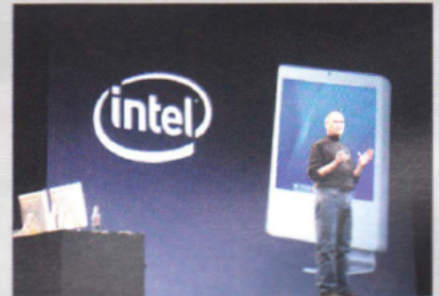
